James 2: 14 - 17

What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if someone claims to have faith but does not have works? Surely that faith cannot save, can it? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

Mark 7: 24 - 30

From there [Jesus] set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. He said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." But she answered him, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." Then he said to her, "For saying that, you may go—the demon has left your daughter." Reflection

I love this passage from Mark's Gospel because it shows to me that Jesus was learning in his ministry, was changing his mind about his mission, and widening his horizons. It demonstrates that God's plan for him was greater than the immediate redemption of the Hebrew nation, as previous prophets had focussed on, and on into the whole world.

Do you remember, at the very beginning of his public ministry, after 40 days in the desert, the devil tempted Jesus and said that if Jesus worshipped him, he would give him the world? Well, it would appear that the world is coming to Jesus. In John's Gospel, the woman at the well spreads the word among the Samaritans after her encounter with Jesus, in Matthew's Gospel we have the story of the healing of the Roman Centurion's servant, and here we have a Syrophoenician woman reminding Jesus that there are people beyond his direct conversations who also need his help, healing and wisdom. Jesus is doing very real things for real people throughout the Gospels and his apostles continue this work after his Ascension as recorded in the Acts of the Apostles. The Epistles give us half the story of the early Church trying to live and love based on the oral written traditions that had come to them from the various sources.

The Epistle of James, thought to be one of Jesus' brothers and leader of the council of Jerusalem, is writing to the predominately Jewish Church, but a church based as far away as Cyprus, Phoenicia and Antioch in Syria. James, here, is telling the churches in no uncertain words, that

declaring that they are followers of Jesus, that Jesus is Lord, is not enough, because it can be done as a purely intellectual process. If they are truly expressing a faith, then they must do it from the heart, and if they can do so they can be saved and justified through faith alone, but not by a faith that is alone (to paraphrase Martin Luther). Genuine faith will create good deeds, good works, but only faith in Christ saves.

When the world is in such as state as it is when I am writing this, mid August, then we can see that actions, righteous actions, loving actions, unselfish actions, kind actions, generous actions are sorely needed, both at home and abroad. I have in my mind the cordons of people protecting people and property from rioters. I have in my heart the aid convoys and volunteer workers taking much needed supplies to Palestine and Ukraine, amongst other places of war, places of disaster, places where weather and earthquakes have torn communities and lives apart.

When such things happen, people often say things like: 'Why is this happening?' 'What have we done wrong?' Why are we being punished?' 'Where is God?' I remember it all being asked after the Boxing Day tsunami in 2004, when we all struggled with the loss of life and devastation. I thought though of the really low points in my life when I was not sure of anything, except that God was with me and was comforted to realise that God would have been with each and everyone of the people affected, as they suffered, and hurt and died.

In the Gospels, many times Jesus heals at a distance, showing that even in his human form, his divinity enabled him to be in more than one place at the same time. We cannot do this, but the effect of our deeds, our works, our actions, as well as our prayers, can make a difference across the world, whether we have donated goods or money or time, whether we have spoken convincingly to people, whether we have started a good idea, or stopped a bad one. Wherever we have spoken and lived out the truth of Jesus, when we have loved our neighbour as ourselves, whether they are like us, completely different, or somewhere in between, our faith is not alone, not empty, not dead.

As Jesus learnt, grew and changed, may we always follow in his Way, striving to be good and true disciples, not tempted by worldly trinkets and false paths, and let our words and deeds reflect each other and God's glory.
