Gospel Reading: John 6:24-35

Once the crowd realised that neither Jesus nor his disciples were there, they got into the boat and went to Capernaum in search of Jesus. When they found him on the other side of the lake, they asked him, "Rabbi, when did you get here?" Jesus answered, "Very truly I tell you, you are looking for me, not because you saw the signs I performed but because you ate the loaves and had your fill. Do not work for food that spoils, but for food that endures to eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. For on him God the Father has placed his seal of approval. Then they asked him, "What must we do to do the works God requires?" Jesus answered, "The work of God is this: to believe in the one he has sent." So they asked him, "What sign then will you give that we may see it and believe you? What will you do? Our ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written: 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat.'" Jesus said to them, "Very truly I tell you, it is not Moses who has given you the bread from heaven, but it is my Father who gives you the true bread from heaven. For the bread of God is the bread that comes down from heaven and gives life to the world." "Sir," they said, "always give us this bread." Then Jesus declared, "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never go hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.

Reflection:

How hungry are you when hunger strikes? Would a slice of bread be enough to satisfy? My Dad often came out with funny memorable phrases. For example when he was hungry he would say, "I am so hungry I could eat a scabby horse between two bread vans!". I guess bread vans dates it! I also recall how my school pal learnt his Mums Coop number and thought it was magic as he ordered all manner of goodies for free, as he thought; for his pals from the Coop bread van! Oops he soon learned the truth! What do you hunger for?

We are part of a consumer culture and getting something for free is definitely an attractive option. Marketing plays on it with ploys like, 'Buy one get one free.' Slogans that fuel the fires of greed and the fears of missing out, FOMO!

The people who kind of stalk Jesus to Capernaum had been part of the multitude that had been fed miraculously from a few loaves and fish. They certainly were suffering from FOMO, they wanted more of what was going for free! To be fair they lived in a harsher world than we do. A world where you lived, 'hand to mouth'. Jesus challenges what they are really seeking for? 'Jesus answered, "Very truly I tell you, you are looking for me, not because you saw the signs I performed but because you ate the loaves and had your fill. Do not work for food that spoils, but for food that endures to eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you".'

Bread is not a major part of our meal nowadays. A savoury main ingredient is more important like meat fish or a vegetarian option. Some people cannot tolerate the gluten in bread flour and they may consume gluten free alternatives. We have such a plethora of bread or bread alternative options to choose from. Others may well avoid this carbohydrate rich part of our diet.

However in Jesus' time bread was the most important part of the meal. And yet the Israelites of the time of Christ's were frugal eaters. Indeed until about just over a hundred years ago, frugality in eating was more imposed than chosen and not just in biblical lands. Worldwide food was more scarce and less convenient than today. It's availability was seasonable, and all the elements needed to be made from scratch, including hauling in the water from wells in certain locations. If you have seen any of the Morrison's 125 year anniversary advertisements, it's interesting to see how buying has changed. From overloaded shopping trolleys of today, to the lady who in the stores earlier days, would select just a slice of a new product to put in her small personal willow shopping basket.

Bread was the essential, basic food in the time frame that our Bible reading is set. So basic was it that in Hebrew "to eat bread" and "to have a meal" was the same thing. Bread was treated with great respect and many rules existed to preserve that reverence. Any crumbs of over the size of an olive were expected to be gathered, and never simply discarded. Bread was never to be cut, but always broken. The poor ate barley bread, the rich bread made of wheat. Barley or wheat grains were ground between two millstones, almost always by women, and this was done at home. From this the flour and then the dough was made and worked in needing troughs. The bread was always made into round shapes. Bread had a very poor keeping quality and would only last for a day or two before becoming mouldy and stale. A great deal of difference to how we think of bread today. I guess if we gave a chunk of bread to the next person who said "what's for dinner?", it wouldn't be as well received as the bread in Jesus' time. And yet bread does have a hunger satisfying attribute. But is that what people are hungry for?

We all have hearts that are hungry for something. I came across an author who said that every person is looking for answers to three fundamental questions:

Who am I?

Where do I fit in?

What am I here for?

These questions of identity, belonging and purpose can be thought of as hungers that we have. We can also be hungry for things like acceptance, self-worth, peace, rest, hope, and the list goes on......So what are you hungry for?

I loved the phrases my Dad came out with. They speak to me of his sense of humour and fun. How he always tried to get close to us and to often lighten a difficult moment. Honestly though the thought of physically eating any animals between any motorised vehicles is less than appealing. I preferred my pals choice, or do I?

What do you think might be the food that satisfies and doesn't spoil today? I am not talking about food with additives to prolong shelf life. Even that eventually spoils.

One of my favourite old time songs is the song, 'Count Your Blessings (Instead of Sheep)". It's a popular song written by Irving Berlin and used in the 1954 film White Christmas. The song arose from a personal experience of Berlin when his doctor suggested he try "counting his blessings" as a way to deal with insomnia brought on by stress. The lyrics to the song focus on blessings as those things that time can't erode or erase, the love of a young family. The song also asks you to think of what you have now in comparison to what you've lacked in the past. What blessings can you recall that have filled your life and given you satisfaction and happiness? Lots of questions for you to think about today.

The initial question in today's gospel reading is very odd. "Rabbi, when did you get here?" That's a strange question to ask, almost like a question they didn't need to know the answer too. It's a kind of 'ice breaker' because the real question that they want to ask is not easy to put. They have had a touch of Gods gracious provision and they wanted more. They had followed him in the first instance 'because they saw the signs he had performed by healing the sick'. (6:2). The people after the feeding wanted to make him their king, how? By force! And so he withdrew and later he and the disciples in the evening, slip away to the other side of the lake, putting about six miles between them and the crowd.

We are one month on from the general election and yet we probably still recall the things that made us choose the party we wanted to vote for and the promises that they made. We have made our choice democratically and certainly not by force. It would be a strange choice to make someone the leader of our nation by force and all because we misinterpreted their actions and words. We wrongly believed they could magically produce everything that will give us everything for our needs. However this is what the crowd intended for Jesus. He would heal the sick and fill their larders. The gospel reading is quite sad and frustrating in that no matter how Jesus tries to explain to the crowd, they still don't seem to understand. The whole of John 6 is about how people want Jesus to give them what they want for themselves and their material needs. There is a kind of grasping greediness in their demands and the whole debate ends in grumbling and dereliction on their part, when they feel that their demands are not being met. They just don't get it, that Jesus is offering them a richer fuller quality of life that transcends the confines of this world, but also demands a change of heart from them. From inward thinking to looking at the world through the eyes of faith and reaching out to fulfil the work of God in sacrifice and service.

When we think of our lives in Christ we know that it is a relationship that will never fade or fall away. Jesus is our constant companion and guide. We might forget him but he never lets us go. Our lives are certainly richer and fuller with him. Another old song I remembered from Sunday school days is, "with Christ in the vessel we can smile at the storm." He is the bread of life that will satisfy our deepest needs when we believe and trust in Him. For our hungers to be satisfied we need a change of heart. As Charles Wesley wrote: 'O for a heart to praise my God, A heart from sin set free.. A heart in every thought renewed. And full of love divine, Perfect and right and pure and good, A copy, Lord, of Thine.
