Reading: Jeremiah 1:4-10

⁴Now the word of the LORD came to me saying, ⁵Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you; I appointed you a prophet to the nations.' ⁶Then I said, 'Ah, Lord GOD! Truly I do not know how to speak, for I am only a boy.' ⁷But the LORD said to me, 'Do not say, "I am only a boy"; for you shall go to all to whom I send you, and you shall speak whatever I command you. ⁸Do not be afraid of them, for I am with you to deliver you, says the LORD.' ⁹Then the LORD put out his hand and touched my mouth; and the LORD said to me, 'Now I have put my words in your mouth. ¹⁰See, today I appoint you over nations and over kingdoms.'

Reading: Luke 4:21-30

²¹ Then Jesus began to say to them, Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing. ²² All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They said, Is not this Josephs son? ²³ He said to them, Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, Doctor, cure yourself! And you will say, Do here also in your hometown the things that we have heard you did at Capernaum. ²⁴ And he said, Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in the prophets hometown. ²⁵ But the truth is, there were many widows in Israel in the time of Elijah, when the heaven was shut up three years and six months, and there was a severe famine over all the land; ²⁶ yet Elijah was sent to none of them except to a widow at Zarephath in

Sidon. ²⁷ There were also many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed except Naaman the Syrian. ²⁸ When they heard this, all in the synagogue were filled with rage. ²⁹ They got up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they might hurl him off the cliff. ³⁰ But he passed through the midst of them and went on his way.

Reflection

How would you feel if you were asked to share your testimony, the story of how you came to faith in Jesus?

If you've ever listened to someone else's faith story, how did you respond?

Many of us may feel inspired by other's stories of how they came to know Jesus, but might feel hesitant about sharing our own journey to faith, especially if it wasn't as dramatic as Paul's encounter on the road to Damascus! Perhaps we can identify more easily with John Wesley's heartwarming experience of coming to a personal faith in Jesus.

But however we feel about our calling as disciples of Jesus, today's Bible readings can offer us much encouragement.

It might be tempting to assume that the Biblical Prophets were great figures who were confident & clever, accomplished speakers and orators, and yet in most cases the opposite is more true, particularly when they received their calling at the start of their ministry.

So we read that when Jeremiah hears God's call, he resists & says "I'm too young, I'm only a boy and I don't know how to speak." Perhaps many of us might feel that way too, and even if we're not as young as Jeremiah was, we can identify with his feeling underconfident about having the right words and knowing what to say.

But God says to Jeremiah "don't say I'm just a boy, because I've known you since before you were born & I've chosen you to be my prophet.

Don't worry about what to say, because I'll give you the words, I'll tell you where to go, and who to speak to and what to say. You don't need to worry about that, you just need to be willing to go, and obey, and don't be afraid."

"Don't be afraid" is one of the most repeated phrases in the Bible.

Jeremiah didn't think he was good enough to be sent out, but he still obeyed and went in response to God and putting his trust in God's promises.

In the gospel reading for today, Jesus is near the beginning of his ministry. After spending 40 days in the wilderness he's been baptised by John and is now in Nazareth, preaching to a home crowd. But they are not sympathetic when he begins to tell them who he really is, and what his message is. And that's because they think they know where Jesus is from & who he is, and whose son he is, and that colours their judgment and prevents them from listening and understanding Jesus' true identity as God's son, and that his words are God's words to them.

The reaction of those who chase Jesus out of the synagogue to the nearby cliff intending to throw

him off is pretty extreme, but Jesus walks through them & goes on his way.

When he was baptised, Jesus was affirmed by God's voice saying "This is my beloved son", so he knows he's loved, he knows who he is, he knows whose message he's bringing. His identity is borne in the love of God and he is filled with the love of God.

Jeremiah also knows he is loved by God and has been since before he was born and that made all the difference for him too.

And we know who we are too: we know we are loved by God who has known us from before we were born. And in response to God's love for us, shown in the teaching and life of Jesus and in his death and resurrection, we've made our commitment to follow Jesus & do whatever he calls us to. Many of us will have renewed that commitment to follow God's leading by making our Covenant prayer this month, as we do each year.

We are people who are defined by the love of God, which makes all the difference to what we do and how we do it – not just in knowing that we're loved personally by God in Jesus, but by being filled with & motivated by that love too.

St Paul reminds us (in I Corinthians I3) that we can do all sorts of things in our own strength, but if we do them without love they're as dissonant & meaningless as a clanging cymbal or a noisy gong. When we act with love in our hearts, when we love others as God does, and when we invite God to fill us with his love through the presence of his Holy Spirit, we find the courage and strength and the words we need to do God's work, as we learn to care as deeply for his people as God does.

What lies at the core of who God is, shown in the love of Jesus who deid for our sakes, in that gift of grace so freely given, is love. That is what gives us our true identity as beloved children of God, called to follow Jesus and allowing God to empower and equip us by the presence of his Holy Spirit living within us, in our hearts and souls and minds. And we're being changed into the likeness of Jesus, who is the essence of love, as he calls us to live and work and speak and love in his name.

We may not feel super-qualified to share our stories about what God's love has done and still is doing in our lives & for others, but like Jeremiah, & Paul, and millions of people across the world, we've been chosen by God in Jesus, who calls us to trust in him, to offer to him all that we have and are – all of our words, our thoughts, our actions, our lives - to be channels of the love of God in Jesus, working in us & through us, to bless the lives of others, especially those who don't yet know how much they are also loved by God.

God will give us the words, Jesus through his Spirit will prompt us about when to speak and what to say, and as we're filled with the love of God, that love will shine out of us for all to see.

We all have a story to tell, we each have our part to play in sharing the wonderful news of the love of God in our world. God in Jesus invites us to come to him to be filled with his love and then calls us to go with him, in his name to share the good news of his love with others.
